The Mission's primary work is to express the love of Christ by helping people overcome the challenges of homelessness. They come to us for **help**. We want them to leave with **hope**. That requires **healing**.

The Mission occupies the space between our clients and the community. **Bridging the gap** by facilitating relationships, from both directions.

Homeless and Hungry in Tacoma: Joe's Story

Like many in our community, Joe was just one paycheck away from homelessness. For him it came

in the form of a torn ACL. He lost his construction job and was unable to make rent.

Joe describes his introduction to homelessness as horrible, "There was nowhere to get food. Nobody to help. You were on your own... sometimes you just didn't eat."



Many families in Pierce County are living just one step away from homelessness.

For the Garcia's, a house fire pushed them over the edge. They couch surfed, but soon their options ran out.

Eventually, they sent their four oldest children to live with an aunt, while Victoria, Jose, and their three younger children lived out of their SUV. It was



Tragedy Led to Recovery: Shavelle's Story

Like most moms, Shavelle never expected to be homeless. She and her daughters were doing well



It started when one of Shavelle's daughters got very ill, and couldn't go to daycare. Shavelle developed crippling anxiety, worrying what to do. She couldn't work without child care.

She lost her job, her car, and finally, her



Joe had never known hunger before. On the streets, he'd go up to three days without food.

"It's kind of like your stomach is eating itself. It is the worst feeling ever. You feel drained. No energy, no nothing."

His relentless hunger brought Joe to the Tacoma Rescue Mission's doors. At the Mission, he was offered food, shelter, and a chance to get back on his feet.

Today, Joe has a new outlook on life, "I have goals now, not like before where it was 'maybe wake up tomorrow'… now, I want to go to college."

For Joe, and many like him, change started with a meal at the Mission.

"It was so uncomfortable with everyone piled on top of each other. The kids would say, 'We're hungry!' It's hard not being able to give them an answer."

The Garcia's pursued many housing options. Though it is rare to find a shelter or affordable housing to accommodate a family of nine, the Mission aims to keep families together.

"When we found out we could come here... we were just so happy to all be together again!"

Today, the Garcia's are reunited at the Mission's Tyler St. Family Campus. They have hope and goals for the future. But there are many more families that are still homeless in our community.
