It takes other people too—walking alongside, listening and loving.


It is in that spirit that we share three stories in this report.

Volunteer Spotlight: Ben And Alex

JUST ONE MENTOR CAN CHANGE A LIFE

Alex and Ben: A Life Saving Friendship

"We had to sleep in a Walmart parking lot in the back of our car," Alex says.

At age six, Alex and his mother fled California to escape an abusive, alcoholic father. Landing in Washington, they found themselves in that parking lot with nowhere else to go.

Just when it felt hopeless, they heard a police officer knock on their car window.

Seeing they were afraid, the officer reassured them. "I'm here to help," he said as he pulled out his cellphone to call the Rescue Mission.

Alex and his mother found themselves in the loving embrace of the Adams Street Family Campus. They finally had stability, not having to worry about their next meal or their safety. Alex even got connected to a mentor to support him through the transition, Ben.

An Unlikely Friend, A Lifelong Friendship

A local college student, Ben, when asked, seized the opportunity to serve as a mentor at the Rescue Mission and was introduced to a 10 year old kid named Alex.

"I still remember the first time I met Alex. He was this pretty quiet kid with glasses... he was very intelligent, very curious, and also I think very interested in there being someone who might want to spend time with him," Ben shares.

This was the beginning of something neither one expected. What began

with uncertainty turned into a lifetime friendship.

"I went into it thinking that I was going to be the one who is guiding a young person and encouraging and offering some advice here." Ben says. "And I did those things, but I didn't realize that I was going to have a much richer life because of that... Alex and I developed this friendship that my life is so much richer and fuller. I now have this new friend in my life."

Over the next several years, Alex and Ben stayed in touch. Seeing Alex's interest in music, Ben even helped Alex get in to the School of the Arts High School in Tacoma.

But meanwhile, home life wasn't easy for Alex. Leaving the Rescue Mission, Alex's mother was diagnosed with cancer and started to become abusive. Alex blamed himself, that he was the one doing something wrong.

Through it all Ben stayed connected with Alex, providing support as much as he could even it was just being there to listen and offer some understanding. By simply being there, Alex was not alone.

Overcoming the Worst

But when the abuse continued, Alex began running away from home frequently and became suicidal.

"I have tried to end my life a lot of

times," Alex says. "Especially when my mom told me I would never amount to anything. I never thought I had anything to live for."

In times like this, just one person makes the difference. In Alex's life, that person was Ben.

"In full honesty, I don't think I would be alive. Ben was my main support when I didn't have anyone." "I don't know how many times I've gone to him like, 'I'm

not okay right now. Something's going to happen.' And he would pick me up."


Alex is now 20. Both his mother and father have passed away. Despite being on his own, he graduated high school, has his own apartment, and a full-time job.

It's been a journey for both – Alex having a friend to walk alongside him and Ben, thankful to see Alex grow and be in an authentic, vulnerable friendship.

"The beauty of watching him go through his life ... my life is so much richer because of Alex," Ben reflects. "If you are interested in growing as a person and develop in authentic vulnerable relationships and passing on some sort of knowledge to people who appreciate it – I'd say everybody should mentor someone at least some part of their life."

After 10 years, Alex and Ben still meet regularly, sharing updates and encouragement, and reflecting on the life-changing influence they've had on each other.

A great room with vaulted ceilings, and a Christmas tree decorated with green and red. A roaring fire and comforting smells coming from the kitchen. Laughing children playing games, decorating cookies, and boxes covered with wrapping paper and bows.

This festive, scene feels like something straight out of a Dickens novel. But in fact it is the annual Christmas party at our Adams Street Family Shelter hosted by the Kiwanis Club of Tacoma.

And you would never guess that those laughing children are members of the families staying at the Mission, children who might otherwise be spending the night in a tent or the back of a car.

Abundance Where You'd Least Expect It

The Kiwanis Club of Tacoma represents one of the many invaluable community groups who help the Tacoma Rescue Mission. In fact, without groups like them and more than 5,000 volunteers who annually serve with us, we'd never be able to do what we do.

Now celebrating its anniversary, the Kiwanis Club of Tacoma is a part of Kiwanis International, including more than 8,344 service clubs across the world who together conduct 150,000 service projects annually. A group single-mindedly committed to service and "improving the World, One Child and One Community at a time," the Kiwanis Club has a distinguished legacy in the Tacoma community of ensuring that the most vulnerable kids in our community are cared for.

In celebration of their Centennial, the Kiwanis Club of Tacoma recently awarded the Mission a large grant to build a much-needed playground at our Adams Street Family campus, to give kids a place to play outside year-round.

Partnerships like this give us a small glimpse of the kind of abundance that God surprises us with, the kind of abundance that Jesus demonstrated when he used a few loaves of bread and fish to feed a crowd of 5,000.

OVER OF A DECADE OF INSPIRING GENEROSITY

“But who else can’t eat breakfast?”

This simple question was asked by family members of the Gary E. Milgard Foundation after a tour of our downtown campus. Seeing the kitchen where the hundreds of breakfast meals are served to guests struggling with homelessness every morning, the Milgard family recognized that there were so many others in our Tacoma community who, while not homeless, didn’t have money for breakfast.

Oftentimes transformational philanthropy begins with a simple question.

This question was the catalyst for expanding our breakfast service to be open to anyone in the community, now for over a decade. It has helped us to serve breakfast to over 29,500 men, women and children experiencing hunger and homelessness this past year.

Created in 2000 by Gary and Carol Milgard, along with their children

Cari, Lori and Mark, the Gary E. Milgard Family Foundation lives out a legacy of philanthropy by supporting organizations like the Tacoma Rescue Mission who are committed to improving lives in Pierce County, particularly for its most vulnerable and impoverished residents.

That One Last Hurdle

The Milgard family shares our belief that a “simple meal” can be life changing for someone who has suffered the hopelessness of poverty, homelessness, and addiction. But, while a meal may be the start of a new life, there are often so many other challenges to escape homelessness.

With the Gary E. Milgard Family Foundation’s support, we were able to directly address these challenges with a special fund—set aside to help someone get over that last hurdle.

A bus pass to get to college. Work boots for a new job. A kitchen table to fill a new apartment. These small things can make all the difference to help people leave homelessness for good.

“It is the Rescue Mission that serves the meals at breakfast, that supports people through addiction recovery, that gives people a second chance. We provide funding so that this work can continue, helping more and more people, and to encourage others to give and to give generously,” says Christine Zemanek, CEO of the Foundation.

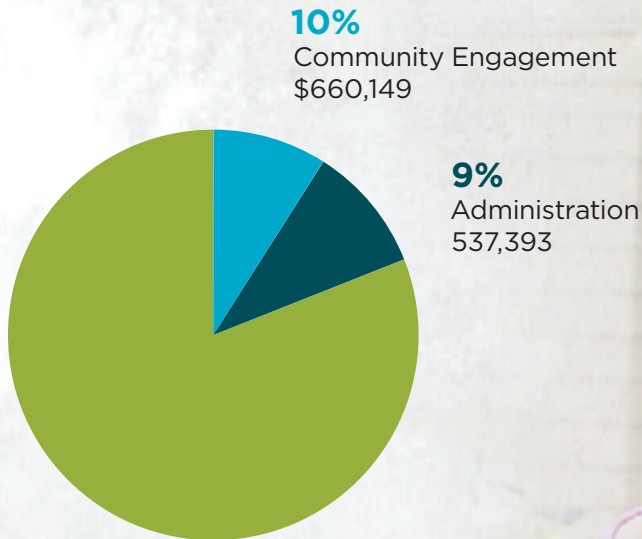

OUR PURPOSE

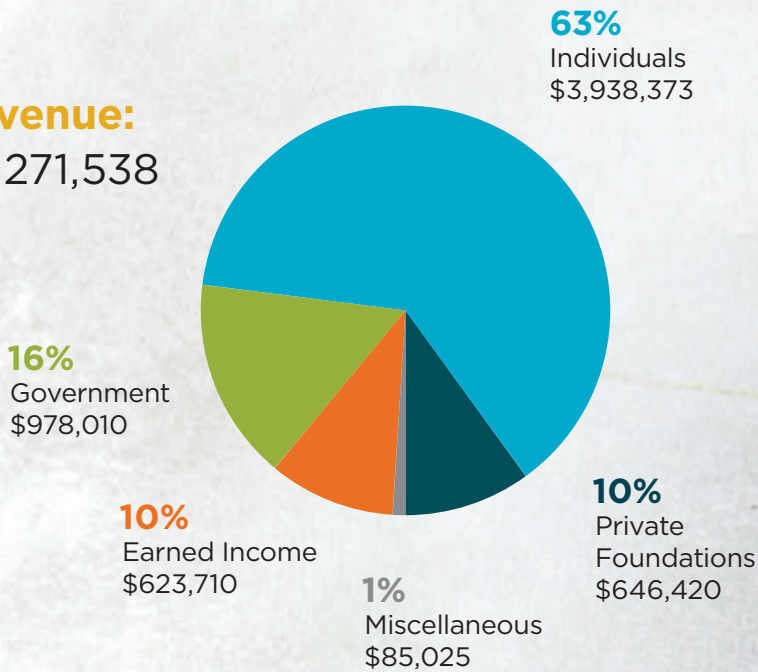

Through your support, you are extending God's help, hope, and healing to the men, women and children in our community who are experiencing homelessness and extreme poverty. **Thank you!**

Here's a snapshot of what your support of the **Mission** helped accomplish this year:



2,354 men, women, children entered the doors of the Tacoma Rescue Mission to receive the life-saving care they needed. That is a 22% increase over last year! Offering them holistic care, we provided warm beds, nourishing meals, education, counseling, addiction-recovery, employment, housing support, as well as safety and support, making sure they know they are not alone and they have choices.



358 left the Mission and entered into stable housing



267 left the Mission with gainful employment



301,799 nutritious meals served to our community's most impoverished



42,589 items of clothing distributed



Over 350 kids were served by the Mission's youth program, receiving care, mentoring and educational support.



78 men and women became clean and sober and found New Life through our addiction recovery program, receiving counseling, education, and Christ-centered care. 72% of our graduates are still sober after two years!



259 people living unsheltered and unsafe on the street were brought to our shelters and other local provider shelters through our Search and Rescue program and the dedicated staff and volunteers that make this program so impactful.



Over 9,300 Community members like you donated 40,122 hours of volunteerism, allowing us to provide more services than would have otherwise been possible.

For the past 105 years, the Rescue Mission has grown in its ability to offer residency-based intervention programs to people experiencing homelessness, alcohol and drug dependency, mental health issues, and poverty. Today we are one of the largest providers of emergency services in the State.
